

Texas students are economically disadvantaged



Texas has more students in poverty than 21 states have people. The attrition rate for economically disadvantaged students is about **29 times higher** than that of their peers



Being poor or minority means you are more likely to be in an underfunded school with teachers who are not well prepared, and you are more likely to be affected by policies and practices that don't work effectively to keep students in school through graduation.

# Texas' most underfunded districts lose students at higher rates

The state's wealthiest 10 percent of school districts lost 18 percent of their Class of 2018

### It doesn't have to be this way

Some school districts are taking big steps to hold on to students...

Pharr-San Juan-Alamo ISD leaders transformed the district by increasing curriculum rigor and connecting all students to college. Over 90% of students are poor. The district is keeping 97% of students in school.
