## Celebrating Emergent Bilingual Students

This spring, IDRA successfully encouraged the Texas Legislature to replace the terms “English learner” and “limited English proficient” for students who speak a home language other than English. Texas now uses the asset-based term “emergent bilingual.” The change in the Texas Education Code went in effect on September 1, 2021. Schools are welcome to make the transition, too!
